Ditch Assessments Postponed. The county supervisors yesterday, in session as a drainage board, extended the time in which the assessments for the Pigeon creek ditch have to be paid until June 5. By granting this extension the necessity of issuing bonds prior to that date to pay for the construction of the ditch will be obviated. Already a considerable proportion of the assessments have been paid and there is money yet in the hands of the treasurer to pay for the work up to date. The total amount of the assessment is about \$40,000, of which \$15,000 has been paid, and it is expected that by June there will be the need of issuing only about \$15,000 or \$20,000 in bonds. About one-third of the ditch has been constructed so far by Contractor Wickham.

The supervisors reconvened in the afternoon in regular session. A number of bridge matters were considered. W. A. Gronowicz was appointed to collect outstanding costs due the county on a commission of 10 per cent.

Turns on Gas in Room in Local Hotel on Retiring for the Night.

DEATH EVIDENTLY DUE TO ACCIDENT

Had Conducted Newspapers at Columbus and Campbell and Was Also Well Known in Omaha and Out in State.

F. H. Gilmore of Campbell, Neb., was found dead in a room at the Kiel hotel early yesterday morning. Death was due to asphyxiation from gas which had escaped from an open jet in the room. The night clerk noticed the odor of gas in the corridor and traced it to Gilmore's room, the door of which was locked. The door of the room was forced and Gilmore was found to be dead in bed. He was undressed and dead in bed, come while the man was asleep. It is believed that Gilmore accidentally turned the stopcock after extinguishing the light before retiring to bed.

Gilmore registered at the hotel Tuesday night as from "The city." From papers found in his pockets it was at first supposed he was from Bladen, Neb., as he had two children at Campbell. A brother lives in that town, and it was not until late in the afternoon that he was identified.

The identification was made by Mrs. W. E. Myers of 544 Mill street, this city, a sister of the dead man, who first learned of his death through the afternoon papers.

From her it was learned that she had come here to visit his mother, who had been in a local hospital, suffering from a fractured limb, but had sufficiently recovered to be removed to the home of her daughter, Mrs. Myers. Gilmore spent the evening with her, but declined an invitation to stop over night, saying he would go to the hotel. Mrs. Myers supposed her brother had returned to Campbell in the morning until on reading an evening paper she learned of his death at the hotel.

Mrs. Myers said she was confident that his death was purely accidental. Gilmore was 32 years of age and leaves a wife and two children at Campbell. A brother lives at Friend, Neb. Coroner Traynor ordered the body removed to Cutter's undertaking rooms and decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

Mr. Gilmore was a newspaper man and had a good standing among his friends. He had a home in Omaha. He once conducted a paper at Columbus and recently at Campbell.

LEGISLATURE ASKS CLEMENCY

Both Houses of Iowa Assembly Desire One Murderer Pardoned

VETO ON FISH PROTECTION MEASURE

Governor Cummins Questions Power of Legislature to Extend Its Sway Over Streams Along State Borders.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, April 3.—(Special.)—Both houses today recommended by resolution to the governor the pardoning of Jasper Mason, convicted in Dallas county of murder. Pardoned for Betsy Smith of Polk county and Orman McPherson of Lottia county, recommended by the pardons committee, were defeated.

Governor Cummins sent to the house today a veto of H. R. 398, a bill for the protection of fish, because it protected fish in the border streams of the state up to eleven inches long and those in the state streams of only six inches, there being a further question of whether the state could legislate to protect fish in the border streams.

Board of Regents Bill Killed. The house listened to a two hour speech in favor of the bill to consolidate the state educational institutions under one board of regents, and then calmly killed the bill by a vote of 6 to 54. No one talked for or against the bill except Peter of Marion, who was a member of the legislative commission that made the investigation of the question, and he talked for it. It was claimed for the last several days that there were sixty-six votes pledged against the measure. The bill was passed by the senate last session and killed in the house, and met the same fate in the same way this session. Early in the session it might have been possible to have gotten the bill through the house, but the tide has been steadily turning for some weeks.

No Adjournment Yet. President Garst, in the senate, and Speaker Kendall, in the house, today informed the two bodies that there could be no adjournment this week, and that the earliest that they could think of adjourning would be Wednesday of next week. There has been passed by the senate a resolution fixing Friday as the day of final adjournment. This will be recalled. A resolution will be introduced to fix next Wednesday the date. Many measures are yet on the calendars and in the hands of committees and the big appropriation bill has none of them been considered yet by either house. A few minor bills only among the appropriations bills have been disposed of.

Concur Unwillingly. The house today unwillingly concurred in the amendments by the senate to the anti-poll tax bill. In the session of next week two doctors and lawyers in each county. Moore of Linn claimed on the floor that taking all the railroads together this would allow thirty or more political agents to be riding on passes. Jones of Montgomery, Sulphur of Polk and several others explained that they would vote to concur only because they feared non-concurrence would defeat the bill and it was better than none.

New Interurbans. An interurban line is being proposed from Webster City to Des Moines. The proposition is to build from Webster City to Boone and from there south to connect with the interurban from Woodward to Des Moines. The new line will not be built by the Polks, who have an agreement with the Fort Dodge, Des Moines & Southern interurban not to parallel that line.

Fix Anti-Trust Law. The senate passed an important act in relation to trusts making an amendment to the Iowa anti-trust law which will re-

move defects which led the courts to hold it to be unconstitutional. This has been on the statute books many years and it will now become operative for the first time.

The senate passed a bill to enlarge the powers of the state railroad commission in the matter of the adjustment of freight rates.

The senate passed a bill providing that before a company can be chartered in Iowa the attorney general must approve the articles of incorporation.

Iowa News Notes. WATERLOO—Lou Smith, a veteran Illinois Central engineer, was buried today. The Masons, Elks and Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, with which organizations the deceased was connected, attended in a body.

CRESTON—New members of the city council have been sworn in and the annual appointments made by the new mayor. The election of city clerk was put off as no agreement could be reached and as considerable wrangling resulted from the discussion. The election of a fire chief and of drivers of the fire apparatus was also deferred as no agreement could be reached. The appointments made by the new mayor are as follows: City marshal, John Whittington; policemen, Moses Robinson, John

Golden, and one to be appointed later; section of Graceland, James McKee. The meeting was quite a tumultuous affair, there being a half dozen applicants for each place and all of the aldermen urging the claim of a different one.

WATERLOO—The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers will fight the case against Roy A. Wood who today was released on \$500 bail. Wood was arrested Sunday as he alighted from his run to Fort Dodge on the Illinois Central train, on the charge of obstructing the tracks of the W. C. F. & N. railway during the recent strikes in this city. Wood claims he is innocent. Detectives have been at work on the case for the past two weeks and other arrests may follow.

CRESTON—O. E. French, superintendent of the Creston public schools for fifteen years, resigned last evening at a meeting of the Board of Education, the resignation to take effect at the close of school year. There has been a great deal of dissatisfaction throughout the city at the conditions in the schools and at the recent school election this feeling was shown by the large vote cast, there being more votes cast than at the city election. Superintendent French's action was taken as the result of this feeling.

Santa Fe Increases Dividend. NEW YORK, April 3.—Directors of the Atchafalaya & Santa Fe Railroad company today declared a semi-annual dividend of 3 per cent on the common stock. This is an increase of 1/2 of 1 per cent semi-annually over the rate paid for several years.
