Easter Bride's Wedding Medal.
Easter brides may take notice of a charming fashion from Paris which has, until now, remained behind it. A firm of jewelers has bought the right to issue a wedding medal designed by E. J. Rolin of New York and Paris, which is struck in Paris at the Monnaie, and is in great demand at weddings. The daughter of a prominent publisher is the first on this side of the water to have examples of this medal at her wedding.
The obverse shows a man and woman seated side by side in chaste and graceful attitudes, the man about to place a ring on the hand of the woman as she salutes her on the brow. Underneath the only inscription is "Semper," alluding to the vow of faithfulness one to the other. The reverse has a pretty decoration of orange flowers, but most of the medal is left free for the names and date to be engraved. These medals can be had in gold, silver or bronze. Medals are so easily transported, take up so little space, and when carefully designed are such exquisite little works of art that it is no wonder the fad of the Renaissance dated on them, nor that of late years the love of them has been revived.
In Paris there are baptism and funeral

as well as marriage medals to be had, modeled by distinguished masters. Mounted firmly on uprights rising from a heavy solid base they make attractive and useful bibelots for the writing desk. Kaldenberg, the expert in ivory, is a specialist for this artistic mounting of medals, using ivory or deer horn for the stands, or other materials when the medal is to be treated like a hat relief and hung on a wall.
Strange Marriage Procedure.
With one foot and half of the body of each of the contracting parties in New York, and the other halves of their persons across the line in Vermont, Joseph Chalmers and Emily Norton managed to get married, March 24, by responding to the questions of two ministers from the corners of their mouths in the state containing the pastor having jurisdiction there.
