WASHINGTON, April 18.-The African board of the Episcopal church is holding its session here, with delegates present from many of the large cities. that "after forty-four years of freedom the American negro is no longer an object of charity nor the ward of the nation," and that "he is now a full grown man, and as such must take a man's place."
