"More opportunities are offered for the promoter along automobile lines than in any other field today," said Benjamin Car Manufacturers' association and president and general manager of the Maxwell-Briscoe company, manufacturers of Maxwell machine, who is in Omaha. "I have been looking over the west with a view of investigating the field and have found places so numerous that it is really bethe best. The mines all need motor cars, as those situated ten and twenty miles from the rallroads are burning up their money by the use of mules Towns situated off the railroad need a motor service,

for that is the cheapest and best, "The most interesting feature of automobiling today is its development in a commercial way, both for freight and passenger service. For the life of me, I cannot see what is going to prevent the passage of the horse within the next five years. The taximeter has already nearly driven him from the streets of Paris and today there are 2,500 taximeters in use. A com-pany is being organized to put them on the streets of New York. Taximeter means measuring the distance you ride. I think the price for New York will be 40 cents for the first half mile and a cents for each eighth of a mile thereafter, making the mile 60 cents and two miles \$1.

"The possibility of the motor trucks and the opportunities offered for the development of the use of them in the west is enormous. They would cost less than onehalf what the mules cost at the mines. Automobile lines will soon be developed where people formerly worked for the troileg.
