ST. PETERSBURG, May M.-A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Nikolai Lenin, leader of the majority faction now attending the social democratic congress in London on the charge of high treason. He will be taken into custody if he returns to Russia. The warrant is against "Vladimir Ulianoff, alias Lenin" and it is said that the police have indentified him as a noted radical leader of the early '90s and a brother of the Ulianoff, who, with four comrades, all armed with bombs, was arrested in 1887 while lying in wait for the carriage of Emperor Alexander II. and who was condemned to death and executed.
