SERMON TO THE GRADUATES

President Fhelton of Simpsen College Delivers Supenigurente Addrest.

URGES UPON THEM HIGH IDEALS OF LIFE

Should Do Their Itmost in Life's Work and Then Life Will Sot Be a Failure Whether One Becomes Famous or Not.

Rev. Charles E. Shelton, president of Simpson college, Indianola, Is., who preached the baccalaureate sermon yesterday afternoon to the senior class of the high school, was greeted by an andience which completely filled the large auditorium of the high school building. His address. which varied in many respects from the usual sermon delivered on such occasions. held the attention of the audience from the opening to the closing sentence.

President Shelton took as his topic, "Know Thyself," and so his text, "As He Thinketh in His Heart so is He." Proverbs. axind. His words," while mainly directed Mr. to the young women and men who are about to start out in life, had much in them for the older folk and especially the parents of the young men and women of the graduating class to take to heart and think over. That the soul was the real self was what the speaker impressed upon the young men and women before him. There was a limit, he explained, to the growth of the physical life, but there was no such limit on the soul of life. Taking Admiral Nelson's famous exhortation to the men of his feet, England expects every man to do his duty," he said a person should not be content alone with doing his duty or her duty. but do as the Japanese admiral said to the men of his fleet as it went forth to do hattle with that of Russia.
