JOKE TO GO TO THIS PRISON

Remarkable State of Affairs Revealed at Thornburg, Near Wassen,

GENEVA. June 8.—(Special.)—Grunder Mrs. Walter Purcell Olds Miss Marie Meek and Gerber, the two convicts who made Mr. Frank Strawn such astonishing revelations concerning the luxurious life at the prison of Thornburg near Wassen have been sentenced to an additional two and one-half years of penal servitude each for escaping from the prison last March. The convicts were arrested at Kanderstag after their escape and it was alleged that the prison discifline was so lax that they were even allowed to leave and resume their occupation as burgiars. When arraigned in court Grunder and Gerber told an amazing story of their luxurious life in prison which was enlivened by frequent excursions to cafes and other places of amuse

ment at Wassen. Grunder said that one convict, a native of Fribourg, became so disgusted with the constant disputes between the convicts and sometimes even with the warders regarding card games that he simply "left" the prison because he could not stand the cheating at the cards any longer. When Grunder and Gerber grew tired of prison life they walked into a warden's room, "borrowed" \$50 and the warden's clothes and went to Wassen, where they discarded their convict dress. The convicts robbed a number of cafes and restaurants and then decided to cross the Gemni pass into the canton of Valois. They were, however, recognized by a gendarme at Kanderstag and were promptly arrested. Both prisoners appeared to be very proud of their exploits and laughed heartly when giving their testimony as well as while sentence was being imposed.
