

SUSPECT IN MURDER CASE

Jack Williams, Laborer, Arrested on Suspicion of Being Guilty. ADMITS FIGHTING FRIDAY NIGHT

Accused to Scene Where Unidentified Man Had Knife Thrown in Back and Seen the Blood.

The initials "A. K." and the name "Kasper" have been found marked several times on the clothing of the dead man.

Jack Williams, laborer on the Union Pacific, was arrested Saturday morning as a suspect in the killing of the unidentified man at Ninth street and Capitol avenue.

Williams said he found wandering aimlessly around the scene where someone slipped a dirk knife into the body of a stranger and left it sticking there.

Williams said he had been employed in the Dolly & Moody camp at the Union Pacific cut-off and was drinking Friday night at Burke's saloon at what is known as the "grave pit."

Williams saw the blood also and then changed his former story, saying he did not run into the dark yards to avoid the other man, but back into the light and into one of the houses.

NEW YORK, June 8.—(R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say: Adverse weather has made the season another week late, both as to distribution of spring merchandise and progress of the crops.

CROSS CURRENTS IN BUSINESS WORLD Prevents Generalization. NEW YORK, June 7.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: Cross currents in trade and crop conditions prevent generalization. There has been a rather slight improvement in crop conditions, due to the slightly higher temperature in the South and West, and a considerable amount of rain in the cotton belt.
