Cigar Dealer Fatally Shot by Accidental Discharge of Revolver.

BUSINESS IN OMAHA

Deceased Conducted Cigar and Confectionary Stand Near Orpheum Theater - Business Turned Over to Wife Saturday.

Omar Simmons, who, with his wife, occuied apartments at the home of L. J. Antoine, 3628 Avenue A. Council Bluffs, met his death at an early hour Sunday morning by the discharge of a revolver. Simmons, during the few minutes which he lived after being shot, made a statement to the effect that the revolver was accidentally discharged.

Simmons arose about 5:30 o'clock and had started to dress, when his wife, who was still sleeping, was awakened by the shot and saw her husband lying on the floor a few feet distant from the bureau, with the blood coming from a wound in the breast near the left nipple. Mrs. Simmons stated that her husband told her he was taking his shirt from the top of the chiffonier, when it caught and discharged the revolver, which had been lying on the chiffonle under the garment. Some one telephoned the police that a man had accidentally shot imself at 3628 Avenue A and asked that a doctor be sent there at once. Falling to get City Physician Rice, the police called upon Dr. Mat Tinley, who went to the house as soon as possible.

To Mr. Anderson, Simmons is said to have stated that the revolver was in the pocket of his shirt and that in pulling the garment over his head, the weapon was discharged. Simmons breathed his last as Dr. Tinley and Officer Sloan reached the house. Simmons conducted a cigar and contec-

tionery store opposite the Orpheum theater in Omaha. It was stated at the house where he lived that on last Saturday he turned over his business in Omaha to his wife and placed such money as he had in one of the banks there in her name. Coroner Treynor, in view of Simmons' ante-mortem statement, will not hold an

inquest.

Simmons and his wife resided at 513 North Twenty-third street, Omaha, from October last until March 13, when they came to Council Bluffs to live and took rooms at the Antoine house. A Division—Only teachers who expect to teach in graded schools, from the third grade up, will enroll in this division. Also principals, supervisors and special teachers. B Division—In this division will enroll all teachers of more than thirty-six weeks' experience, who expect to teach in rural schools.

CHANCE FOR YOUNG MEDICS

Opportunities Offered by Uncle Sa in Health and Marine Hospital Service.

The public health and marine hospital service of the government is anxious to secure a number of young physicians. To this end a board of officers will convene at the bureau of public health and marine hospital service, 3 B street SE., Washington, D. C., Monday, July 15, at 10 a. m., for the purpose of examining candidates for admission to the grade of assistant surgeon in the public health and marine hospital serv-

Candidates must be between 22 and 20 years of age, graduates of a reputable medical college, and must furnish testimonials from responsible persons as to their professional and moral character.

The following is the usual order of the examinations: 1, physical; 2, oral; 3, written: 4. clinical.

In addition to the physical examination, candidates are required to certify that they believe themselves free from any ailment which would disqualify them for service in

which would disqualify them for service in any climate.

The examinations are chiefly in writing, and begin with a short autobiography of the candidate. The remainder of the writ-ten exercise consists in examinations of the various branches of medicine, surgery and hydrons. he oral examination includes subjects

of preliminary education, history, litera-ture and natural sciences.

The clinical examination is conducted at a hospital, and when practicable, candidates are required to perform surgical operations on a cadaver. required to person.

Upon appointment the young officers are, as a rule, first assigned to duty at one of the large hospitals, as at Boston, New York, New Orleans, Chicago or San Francisco. The widow, with two sons and two daughters, survive him, Mr. Mackenzie was an unobstrusive, unostentatious gentleman, closely devoted to his business, and he held the close confidence of the few employers he had ever worked for and an enviable reputation for integrity among his customers.


