While Judge Smith McPherson was in the United States district court awaiting the arrival of the attorneys for the principal rallroads of Missouri, who had brought a ing them from fighting law in state courts, joint suit asking him to enjoin the enforcement of these new laws, the attornevs were holding a conference over a new turn in affairs. During the morning the circuit quurta, both in Kansas City and St. Louis, had, upon petition of Attorney General Hadley, issued an injunction against the railways, compelling them to obey the laws. The suits were filed in Kansas City by James C. Kennish, assistant attorney general, and in St. Louis by Mr. Hadley.

Pederal Suit Postponed. When the railway attorpeys finally came to the federal court their suit was postponed by Judge McPherson until tomorrow. The rallway attorneys urged a postpomement of the case for ten days or two weeks but this Judge McPherson refused. Yesterday the judge had issued an order, upon request of the realroads, restraining the complainants from putting into effect and complying with the laws, and today, when the complication in the circuit pourt's action arose, be continued his order in effect. This, the court said, he did "as great harm might be done and much confusion arise if the status quo should be changed."

> Report that Corpses of All Victims of Naval Disaster Were Found is Denied.

> NORPOLE, June 14.- The report that all he bodies of the midshipmen and seamen of the launch of the Minnesota, which was lost Tuesday night, had been recovered, is denied by naval officers. Early this morning it was stated that none of them had been found, although the dredging was continued all day yesterday.

It now seems to be accepted in navy circles that the little launch was run down by a coal barge shortly after the frail boat carrying the eleven men left Discovery landing. It was learned here today that Commander William H.
