School Controversy Interests.

The controversy over one phase of the new certificate law in Iowa is becoming a matter of public interest. State Superintendent Riggs has ruled, on the advice of the attorney general, that a teacher can pay the institute fee or examination fee in her home county and then take the examination at any summer school maintained. This affects Blackhawk county but have not yet been sentenced. It is where the state normal is located and County Superintendent Elliott, of that county, has defied the state authorities.

PERILS OF THE COOLING PLANT

Ammania Refrigerating Process is Classed as Extra Hazardous for Workmen.

During the last five months twenty-two persons have been kifed and many times that number injured by accidents in the cooling rooms of one packing house. In addition there is reason to believe that other accidents happened in the same establishment which did not become known to the public because there was no loss of life. Could these accidents have been prevented? Some of them, perhaps, but not all of them"under existing conditions.

The danger of the ammonia refrigerating process lies in the great pressure of expanding gas within the cooling pipes. This ressure, 600 or 700 pounds to the square gas. inch, is resisted by iron pipes of a thickness to resist, theoretically, 2,000 pounds to the square inch.
