Papa-Cy was arraigned before United States Commissioner Anderson Monday morning. He entered a plea of not guilty, but declined to have anything to say. He is a low browed negro of brutal cast of features and bears all the marks of the desperado. According to Howard's story he gets his name Papa-Cy, from the sprinkling gray in his hair. He was not excused. WYOMING CROPS AND SOIL Conditions Along the Burlington Benefited by General Heavy

Rains. The Burlington crop and soil report for the district of Wyoming for the week ending June 15 shows heavy rainfall on all divisions, with an average precipitation of about one and a half inches. On the Alliance division wheat is doing well, with prospects for an average crop, and warm weather is helping the wheat on the other divisions. Some damage is reported on the Guernsey line on account of hail.

Oats are doing well and the warm weather and the condition of the soil have been favorable. On the Sterling division the indications now are the yield will exseed that of last year.

Corn plowing has begun on the Alliance division, but some replanting was necessary. The soil has been too wet for culivation on the Sterling division, but as a general thing the stand is good. Potatoes are doing well on all divisions, as are also sugar beets, although scarcity of help is making cultivation slow.

Meadows and pastures are growing fast. irass is a heavy growth and live stock of all kinds is in good condition. The first cutting of alfalfa will not be quite as good as usual, because of the wet weather. Reports from the Sheridan division still inlicate a good crop of wool, which is coming in generally along the line. Shearing s well under way and will continue for some time.
