All persons violating any of the above provisions will be liable to arrest and prosecution... Wholesalers Prepare Plans for New Six-Story Building... NINTH AND HARNEY LOCATION... BLACK BASS FOR CUT-OFF

Three-Five Thousand Fish Are Bought in Lake from State Hatchery... Deputy Fish Commissioner O'Brien and Deputy Game Warden Chester arrived in Omaha early Thursday morning with 3,000 to 4,000 black bass by and proceeded to one in cut-off lake, where they were planted for the fishermen to land in about three years... The fish were started from the hatcheries at South Bend about 4:30 Thursday morning and came through in two shapes, not a fish showing the white feather and succumbing to the weather and travel... Mr. O'Brien said he had been remarkably successful with his bass this spring and those he brought to Omaha were in fine condition... 'Cut-off' lake is especially well adapted for bass, said Mr. O'Brien, 'and we want to do all we can for that lake because of the activity of the Omaha Rod and Gun club in protecting the fish we plant there... The 3 weeks old bass could easily be recognized as bass and from the time this fish is hatched it has all the markings of a bass... The commissioner thought they would get along nicely at the lake because of the water and mud in which they could hide and take for themselves until they are large enough to keep out of the road of other fish which would want them for food... Sun fish make life more miserable for those youngsters than any other kind of fish... ASSESSMENT ON BIG STORES... Figures Modified Somewhat on Property of Brandeis and Hayden Bros... The assessments of J. L. Brandeis & Sons and Hayden Bros. were taken up by the County Board of Equalization Thursday morning with Arthur Brandeis and John L. Kennedy, representing the Brandeis store, protesting against the increases made in the valuation of the store for the present year by County Assessor Reed... The assessment of the Brandeis stock was increased by the assessor from \$200,000 last year to \$400,000 this year and the new building was assessed at \$300,000... Mr. Brandeis asked the assessment on the stock be left at last year's figure and that on the store be reduced to \$300,000... After listening to the testimony offered by Mr. Brandeis the board cut the assessment on the stock to \$400,000 and the building to \$200,000... Mr. Hayden did not object to his real estate assessment, but a reduction in the \$400,000 assessment on the stock... He wanted it left at \$400,000 last year's figure... Mr. Trainor moved to grant this request, but he was voted down 4 to 1, Brunting and Haverly voting with him... The hearing of the protest against ex-Senator Millard's assessment was continued until Friday morning at the request of Mr. Millard... NEW THOUSAND-MILE BOOK... Form of Transportation is to be Granted by the Burlington Railroad... CHICAGO, June 20.—(Special Telegram.)—The Burlington road will announce that beginning July 1, it will place on sale 1,000-mile books, good in Nebraska, good for bearer and any number of persons, at the rate of \$20, or 2 cents a mile... This is the form of mileage book the jobs of Nebraska have been working for for some time. It will be of great convenience to Nebraska traveling men, affording them a convenient method of carrying their transportation... When the Nebraska legislature was about to pass the 2-cent passenger fare bill, the railroad officials held a meeting in Omaha, attended by the leading officials of all the Nebraska roads and decided to put in effect a 1,000-mile book, which was sold for \$20, or 24 cents a mile... The passage of the 1-cent bill this book was of little value, as all could buy tickets at the various stations at 2 cents a mile... This new ticket will be convenient, as it will do away with the necessity of the traveling men having to wait their turn in line at stations, and train time, besides being otherwise a great convenience to those who have much traveling to do... SUIT TO ANNUAL PREMIUMS... Aged Man Seeks to Knock Out Increases in His Insurance Assessments... David Downey, a policy holder in the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance company, has gone into district court to knock out the increases in his premium payments, which he says have become so great as to be prohibitive... He has secured a restraining order from Judge Sutton to prevent the cancellation of his policy by the company during the pendency of a suit... He took a policy in the company November 7, 1904, his bi-monthly payment being \$4.20... In 1906 he says it was increased to \$12.20, two years later to \$14.20 and February 1, 1907, to \$14.40... He lays the blame on the alleged conversion of the reserve fund to other uses, and the authorities are set off into classes which materially increases the cost of his insurance... He says he is willing to pay his pro rata share of the death losses of the company, but no more... He is now 72 years and has paid \$70 into the company and he charges an attempt is being made to drive him out to avoid the risk incurred by his policy... He wants the court to determine how much he can rightfully be required to pay... LAW FOR BILLBOARDS PUZZLE... Matter of Drafting Suitable Ordinance Taxes Inequity of City Attorney... The city legal department is experiencing considerable difficulty in preparing an ordinance to regulate billboards which will pass the city council... The ordinance is drafted the laws and regulations of other states and cities are being studied with a view of avoiding those points which have caused other laws to be declared invalid... The result of this survey has been to collect a large amount of information on the subject which is interesting, but of comparatively little value, as courts have expressed so many divergent opinions that it is almost impossible to decide upon any rule for billboards... A suggestion has been made that the city can compel owners of boards to brace them on both sides and this bracing may occupy sufficient space to carry the boards the distance of their height from side-sides... Before the law is incorporated in the ordinance the board will be examined in the light of recent decisions...
