Magnificent Color Scheme.

In such a setting the scheme of decora tion is on a large and dignified scale and magnificently has it been carried out by the local authorities responsible in this instance. The coloring is rich but substantial and is chiefly obtained by the lavish use of gorgeous eastern tapestries and rugs upon the floor and walls in sombra but magnificent tints of crimsons, blues and golds; and the enormous floor space available has enabled the architect to arrange with convenience and even beauty, for the seating of two hundred and fifty representatives from nearly fifty nations.
