





TRAVIS WINS THE GOLD MEDAL

Former Champion Turns in Lowest Card-Eighteen Westerners, Thirteen Easterners and Two Canadians Qualify.

CLEVELAND, O., July 11 .- Thirty-thre contestants for the national amateur golf championship yesterday finished qualifying rounds with scores of 165 or better. Nothing could better show the high class of the field that is entered for this year's championship than these scores, the high figure being four strokes better than that of a year ago at Englewood, N. J., when 169 qualified.
