Italian Lender Declares that Devotech Are Blending with Socialists Everywhere,

MILAN, July 13 .- (Special.) - The wellknown Italian anarchist leader, Saverio Merlino, who was once imprisoned and went to live abroad, was interviewed on the anarchist convention at Luxembourg. He said that he believes that anarchism is nearing its end. It has lost all of its importance, having parity blended with socialism, while the part of it which represents Utopla was recognized as such and
consequently forsaken. The anarchist

laundry on North Main street, Council Bluffs, was blown early Saturday morning, \$118 was stolen and the burglars escaped. Fire broke out following the blowcaped. Fire broke out following the blowing of the safe and consumed practically the entire plant, with a loss of \$15,000.

The safe was blown with nitro-glycering and the heavy door was thrown by the force of the explosion against the opposite wall of the office. Though the laundry is located in the thickly-populated district of the city, no one heard the explosion, and the first knowledge that a crime had been committed was when Charles Alexander, hostler in the Lovejoy livery barn opposite, saw flames issuing from the building. This was at 4:25 o'clock. He turned in in an alarm and the robbery was discovered after the flames had been extinguished.

The only clew to the robbers is that given by a newsboy, who saw two men run through the alley ligading out from the laundry, then go west on Broadway and enter a buggy hitched behind the trees on Seventh street. They drove rapidly away. The boy was not able to give a good description of the men.
