

## JOKES ON BERLIN BUILDINGS

Quaint Ornaments a Feature of Architecture.

## SYMBOLIC DESIGNS AND PURE FUN

Pons Asinorum on a School for Boys and Playful Bears Are to Be Found on All Sorts of Buildings.

Nobody familiar with the usefulness of modern German cities would say that the architects had any sense of humor. The blocks of overlaid stucco houses are as depressing in Breslau as they are in Munich, with no suggestion of humor or even taste to illumine them. There may be a great deal of taste, just as there was in one other noted case, but most of it is bad. It was only in the use of classic models that the German architects became in the least degree interesting, although it could not be said that they showed humor in them.

Now they have decided to show humor in their work whether be appreciated by their competitors or not. So we have on many of the public buildings recently erected in Berlin designs that show a tendency to return to the times in which the

great ecclesiastical architects loved to have their little jokes. Gargoyles, figures carved on buttresses on the tops of columns or figures anywhere might be made the source of humor without spoiling the ecclesiastical atmosphere a church ought to possess. This is the kind of a joke that the Berlin architects are enjoying nowadays wherever they find an appropriate field.

Like those of their predecessors, the jokes of the Berlin architects are not visible to the superficial observer. It takes a careful and sympathetic eye to catch them. One would have to look hard, for instance, to see the point of the decorative detail over one of the doors in the new district school on the Kopen Platz. The "Pons Asinorum" is here immortalized in stone, however, and the truth that the fifth proposition in the first book of Euclid impresses on the student is pictured in red sandstone. Students who get into the habit of looking up at the carving every morning are not likely to forget that the sum of the squares of two sides of a right angled triangle is equal to the square of the hypotenuse.

Similar decorations show the development of a young girl on the capitals of three pillars in school in Berlin. On the first is the head of a child starting confidently into a world about which she knows very little, while rollers, figures, a slate and copy book forming the background indicate the subjects occupying her thoughts. On the second capital she is shown with some of her school friends and is now thinking of knitting stockings. On the third capital she has developed into young womanhood and the fattiron, sewing machine and market basket are the objects of her thoughts. More elaborate is the capital of another girl's school in Berlin which is shown here. It has an allegorical significance which contrasts the old methods of teaching girls with those prevailing today. The portal of the girls' school seems inclined to look with favor on the days in which the school teacher was an old woman who came to her pupils with her knitting in her hand. She was at all events to inspire them with a desire for learning and we see the child near her reaching out for the laurels that go to the faithful student.

The youthful teacher of the day, shown with a drawn, rather nervous look as a result of all her various studies, can occupy such place with her pupil, who is as little interested for herself as for her doll and makes no effort to clutch the laurels within her reach. The corresponding portal to this, which is not shown here, had the effect of indicating that the new teacher was better for the boys than the old man was for the girls. On the door of a gymnasium four bears are shown in a tripping and a lifting weights, two are playing

leapfrog and a third is doing athletic exercises on a bar.

On one of the new swimming baths in Berlin are the diving ducks used here as a capital, and here also is the turtle instructing two fishes in the art of playing the flute. Then there are in the same school bas reliefs of the frogs going out rowing and learning to swim. They are frankly humorous, with none of the more poetic and symbolic character of the portal. For instance, to the girls' school.

## "OLD BILL" WAS A HUMMER

Active Career of the Original "Hands Up" Man Now Serving a Life Sentence.

William A. Pinkerton, head of the detective agency, makes a point of keeping in

close touch with the police authorities all over the country, and never misses a convention of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. They met in Jamestown a few days ago, and Mr. Pinkerton told them the story of "Old Bill" Miner, who first used the expression "Hands up!" a cry which has started so many thousands of victims.

Miner, according to Mr. Pinkerton, was one of the first hold-up men to operate on the Pacific coast, and is now serving a life sentence in the New Westminister, British Columbia, penitentiary for the robbery of a Canadian Pacific train at Durrer, B. C., early in the morning of May 9, 1906.

"Old Bill" Miner, said Mr. Pinkerton, "was one of the most remarkable single handed stage and train robbers who ever operated in the far west. He never belonged to any organized band of hold-ups, generally working alone. On rare occasions, however, he selected an assistant. He always went about his work in a matter-of-fact way, never posing as a 'bad man' and never taking human life.

"As early as 1869 he served a term for stage robbery in San Quentin. When he got out of prison in 1879 he robbed the Del Norte stage in Colorado of \$3,000. He escaped with the booty, finally going to Michigan, where he posed as a California capitalist. When his funds ran low he returned to Colorado and took part in several other hold-ups.

"For a California stage robbery in 1881 he was sentenced to twenty-five years, and was released in 1891. His long imprisonment apparently did little to reform him, for in a year or two he held up the Great Railway and Navigation company's train

Although a reward of \$1,300 was offered for Miner he was not captured.

"A year later he held up the Canadian Pacific's transcontinental express at Mission Junction, B. C., securing \$16,000 in gold dust and money. The Dominion government offered a \$5,000 reward for him, which was increased to \$12,500 by the rewards of the Canadian Pacific and the provincial authorities.

"Ignoring the price on his head, Miner held up another Canadian Pacific train at Durrer, B. C. He compelled the engineer to uncouple the mail car and haul it a mile from the rest of the train, where he rifled it of registered letters. Miner believed that the express packages were in the mail car, and when he found they were not he did not have the nerve to go back. He escaped to the islands off the coast. The large rewards offered induced posses to take up the pursuit, and he was captured by the Canadian constabulary after having put up a fight in which one man was wounded. He was sentenced to imprisonment for life."
