SUIT TO SET ASIDE POLICY Mutual Life Alleges that Kansas Man Secured Contract by Fraud.

TOPEKA, Kan., July 20.—The Mutual Life Insurance company of New York filed a suit in the United States court here today asking that the life insurance policy for \$100,000 issued by the company to Lucius H. Perkins of Lawrence, Kan., be set aside.
