GAS BELOW THE GRADE LINE Quality Not Up to Legal Test, as Shown by Commissioner

Crowley. Gas Commissioner Crowley reports the result of a series of tests of gas made Tuesday to be a showing of an average of 598.69 thermal units to the foot of gas, the three tests showing 590.4, 600.6 and 589.7 for the day. This is lower than the ordinance requires and the company was requested to

turn on the heat. The commissioner is now preparing to test the quantity of sulphur in the gas. For twenty-four hours, since 11:50 o'clock Tuesday morning, a jet has been burning in the commissioner's office and steam collected in a vessel. This will be run through a number of devices and subjected to chemical treatment to show the total amount of sulphur thrown off by a given quantity of the gas. The first experiment will be for the purpose of testing the mechanism of the office and the first real test will be held later. The sulphur test will require three days for completion.
