Individual medals won by the men were First Division-Gold medal, Anton Pesek

of Schuyler, 154.5 points; silver medal, Frank Krecek of Omaha, 145.5 points. Second Division-Gold medal, John Pesek of Schuyler, 148.9 points; silver medal, John Holub of Schuyler, 146.2 points.

Third Division-Gold medal, Rudolph Kovar of Schuyler, 122.7 points; silver medal, Bed Barta of Omaha, 11.3 points.

Omaha Girls Are Winners.

The Omaha girls came out with colors flying, carrying off medals and honors in both individual and classwork. The individual medals won by girls at the tournament were as follows:

Gold medal, Mamle Kment of Omaha, 45.8 points; silver medal, Clara Zeleny of Bouth Omaha, 45.7 points.

In the classwork Schuyler took first place in the second division, with \$23.5 points. Wilbur was second in this division, with 745.4 points.

The Omaha class took first place in the third division, with 573.3 points. Ord came second, with 536.3 points.

The Omaha girls took first honors in Brokers classwork, scoring 249.4, and the South Omaha girls took second place, with 236.8 points.

Following the announcement of these medals and honors and the awarding of diplomas to those who had made sufficiently good scores in their respective divisions to entitle them to promotion to the next GAMES IN THE IOWA LEAGUE higher divisin, Mayor Dahlman spoke.
