Dun's Report on Bank Clearings

Sank clearings for July, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., reflect larger payments in that month at nearly all cities in the United States than in any mid-summer month of any preseding year, total bank exchanges for the month at all cities reporting being \$12,322,586,463, an increase of 5.8 per cent over last year and of 13.4 per cent over the corresponding month of 1905. There is a small gain at New York City, notwithstanding the smaller volume of stock trading in Wall Street this year, and the much lower security values, which would reduce the volume of payments on Wall Street account quite heavily; on other account payments have clearly been much larger. Much the same condition prevails at Boston and Philadelphia which report gains. Many manufacturing centers in New England and the Middle Atlantic States show heavy payments through the banks, and at Pittsburg and other iron centers there is evidence of continued activity. There is further improvement at the South, and most of the cities report an increase over both preceding years, with noteworthy gains at St. Louis and other central points. In the West exchanges atill show a very large volume of business. Obleago reports a heavy increase, as do other Western cities, notably Minneapolis, Kansas City and many smaller towns.
