In Georgia there is an army of 182,000 working women. About the same proportion of men work for wages in Georgia as the general average for the United States, but we are confronted by the curtous fact that Georgia's proportion of working women is half as high again as the average for the whole country. Twenty-seven per cent of the women of Georgia are employed for wages. Again, while only one married woman out of twenty works in the United States as a whole, one married woman out of every seven is at work in Georgia. In Georgia there is an army of 182,000

Naturally, a large proportion of these working women are negro domestic servants. Many of them are descrited mothers of children, others are not supported by their husbands, and still others are while working women forced by the low family wage to take up their part of paid labor. Over 118,000 of them little girls, are working for wasse in Georgia.


