Iowa Agricultural Expert Returns from European Trip. BRINGS PURCHASES WITH HIM

Legislature Made Appropriation that Will Assist Breeders of State—Question for Supreme Court.

The legislature last winter made a special appropriation of \$2500 to be used with a like sum given by the government, which gives a total of \$5000 altogether for a period of two years, and additional appropriations will be made later.
