CHICAGO, Sept. 2 -- A special to the Record-Herald from Washington says: Interstate Commerce Commissioner Frankita K Lane will leave Washington tomorrow for a protracted tour of the west. which is likely to bear very important results. In addition to looking into the matter of how thoroughly certainbig rallroad systems have been living up to the anti-rebate provisions of the rate law, Mr. Lane will devote particular attention to the car shortage situation with a view to proventing a recurrence of the deplorable nditions that existed last winter.

Perhaps the car shortage feature ought to be given prominence in connection with Mr. Lane's errand, as his investigations, together with the carnestness of the railroads in keeping their promises to furnish better service to shippers may have a great deal to do with indicating the need of further legislation affecting transportation at the coming session of congress. The commissioner undoubtedly will use his influence to have the carriers meet the demands of the western country and prevent if possible agitation to force more drastic logislation than already has been enacted

German Military Authorities Find Military Instructions on Person of Traveler.
