

demand for cash grain was strong and it was reported that the export business in flour was excellent. The market closed strong. December opened 1/03/4c higher at 29/4/0994/c, sold between 95% c and \$1.01% and closed at \$1.09% 61.09%. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 22,000 bu. Primary receipts were 733.000 bu., as against 525.000 on the same day last year. Minneapolis, Duluth and Chicago reported receipts of 466 cars, as against 228 last week and 43 a year ago. and for ca grain was strong and it

year ago.
The corn market opened strong on cool weather throughout the corn belt and the prediction that it will continue. During the day all the futures reached a new high price level for the crop. The demand for cash corn and the strength of wheat were, next to the weather, the chief builish factors. Southwestern and western markets were relatively lower than Chicago, and it is believed that this fact will soon increase the local receipts. December opened leftic and face and closed at 61% c. Local receipts were 385 cars, with 181 of contract grade. The oats market again made a new high record for the crop. Offerings were small because of the poor quality of the grain thus far received, and shorts and builts bought in lively fashion throughout the government figures for August was also a strong factor. December opened ic higher at 55% c, sold between 51% c and 51% and closed at 51% c. Local receipts were 22 cars.
