May Build Elevator This Fall. The Nebraska Hay and Grain company may build an elevator on its site in Council Bluffs this fall, instead of waiting until spring, as was proposed when the elevator was first projected. The matter is under consideration now and will be settled within a week or two.

Exodus of Grain Dealers. The exodus of grain dealers from the Board of Trade to the Brandeis building will begin Saturday. The grain exchange will move Monday. Dr. Pickens and Dr. Cronell have secured offices in the Board of Trade building and other business and professional men are negotiating for space.

Suit to Annul Taxes. The suit of John N. Chan of South Omaha against the city of South Omaha to annul the special taxes for the repaving of Twenty-fourth street was begun before Judge Kennedy Friday. Chan asserts the repaving could not legally be ordered, as a majority of property owners on the street had protested against it. He also contends the law under which it was done was unconstitutional and the history of repaving ordinance was faulty.

Big Dodge County Corn. S. J. Brown of the Trans-Mississippi Grain company had three mammoth ears of corn on ex-

hibition on the floor of the Omaha Grain exchange Friday, which excited the admiration of all the traders. The corn was grown near North Bend and was sent in by Downing & Purcell, elevator owners at that place. "If the corn is all like that Dodge county must have an enormous yield," said those who saw the ears.

Railroads Will Show Them. Kansas railroads are making arrangements to withdraw all special rates, clerical rates and special privileges which have been in effect to this time. This will be done on the day the railroads put in effect the 2-cent passenger fare rate under protest, for on that day the railroads will see to it that 2 cents is the minimum rate as well as the maximum. To that end the railroads are clearing the slates of all special privileges and he who rides will have to pay 2 cents a mile.

Transfer of Megenth Property. Deeds have been recorded transferring from the various heirs of the late J. G. Megenth to the Douglas Security company 100 or more parcels of real estate belonging to the estate. The Douglas Security company was organized for the purpose of handling the real property in the estate. The deeds were given by Ida J. Megenth and George W. Megenth of Omaha, Joseph P. Megenth of Salt Lake City, Samuel A. Megenth of Franklin, Pa., and Edgar B. Robinson, attorney for the estate.

Sprinter Catches Chickens. For being the champion sprinter of the crowd, C. H. Andrews, an employe at Union station, was rewarded by catching three chickens which escaped from the express rooms Thursday, and was arrested for stealing, but later dismissed. Andrews told in police court how many chickens escaped from the crates and that expressmen would not stop to run them down. It is an unwritten law that whoever catches the chickens may have them for pot pie or with spaghetti. Andrews was able to catch three out of five which escaped Thursday.

Who Shall Have Dead Animals? The legal contest between James Wheelan and the City Garbage company for the privilege of hauling dead animals out of the city of Omaha was begun before Judge Sutton Friday morning. Wheelan claims he has a contract for three years to do all the work in the city and that his agree-

ment excludes all others. The City Garbage company has recently been taking some of the work away from him and he is seeking an injunction to stop it. The work is done for nothing, but the profit lies in the sale of the various parts of the dead bodies, which are of value.

St. Mary's Awaits Tracks. Acting under orders received from the city council about a month ago, the street railway company is tearing up its old tracks on St. Mary's avenue from Twenty-second to Twenty-sixth street and is removing the cobble stones preparatory to laying asphalt. It is also removing the tracks on Webster street, west of Sixteenth. These tracks were laid many years ago by Dr. S. D. Mercer, but they have been used only very little.

Unlucky Man in Trouble. Because J. T. Lyons, a tall, well-dressed colored person, had the misfortune to have a long, wicked butcher knife slip through his trouser pocket and imbedded itself snugly in his bright, red hoisery, he has been marked at the police station as a bold, bad man. Lyons threatened to scatter the officer who arrested him around over the pavement of Fifteenth and Dodge streets, until the coroner was compelled to soak up the remains with gasoline, but he told the story of how he drank gin all the time but never got drunk, and how the knife slid into his hoisery, with such earnestness that five days in jail satisfied the law.

Salacious Grounds of Divorce Plea. A suit for divorce from Joe Kudrna, alleging he is jealous of her son-in-law, and has threatened to injure her. She also secured a restraining order from Judge Kennedy to prevent him from talking violently to her or from coming to their home. She says he uses intoxicating liquor and when drunk strikes and beats her and calls her vile names in the presence of their children. A year ago she applied for a divorce, but on his promises to do better she dismissed the suit. She says he has resumed his previous conduct and she can live with him no longer. Daniel Eberhardt has applied for a divorce from Anna. The petition was withdrawn.

Horse Criminally Negligent. Contributory negligence on the part of his horse prevented Henry McCubbun of South Omaha from securing a judgment of \$300 against the Omaha & Council Bluffs Street Railway company in county court Friday. McCubbun's horse wandered on the street car tracks between Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh and Q street and was struck by a motor car. Its leg was broken and it was shot. McCubbun asserted the motorcar was being negligent. The evidence disclosed that the animal had negligently run in front of the car as it was approaching and even then had had time to get off the track if it had not been hobbled before it was turned out on the street to graze. Judge Leslie decided it was the horse's own fault, aided and abetted by its owner in hobbling it and decided for the defendant.

Leaves Wife to Go to War. Harold C. Stanley deserted his wife to go to the war in the Philippines, according to the story told by Mrs. Maria Stanley in Judge Redick's divorce court Friday and he has not been contributing to her support since, she declares. They were married shortly before the Spanish-American war broke out and after living together three months, Mr. Stanley went to Texas, where he enlisted in a regiment bound for Manila. The doctor's she sought for was granted on the ground of non-support. Beatrice Jopling has started suit for divorce against John Henry Jopling, who, she says, is sometimes known as John Joseph Rouse. She says they were married November 3, 1906, in Council Bluffs and he abandoned her August 27, 1907. She also charges him with non-support and the name of his maiden name, Davenport, restored to her.

LOTS FOR MANUFACTURERS

Two Tracts of Land in South Omaha Bought for New Enterprises.

Two tracts of land in South Omaha for the location of manufacturing enterprises have been bought by H. M. and S. B. Christie. The most recent purchase was made Friday, when the Christies came into possession of three-quarters of the block between A and E streets and Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth. The Christies have held this under contract for a year, but this week paid the money and took the deeds. A flour mill was expected to locate here, but the council refused to vacate a part of C street and the deal was killed.

J. F. Lenger has sold the half lot and building at the northwest corner of Thirtieth and William street to Yao Dusatko for \$3,000.

James Seeger has sold to W. H. and J. R. Seeger his lot and building at the northwest corner of Thirtieth and L streets, South Omaha, for \$4,000.

BRIDE IS NOT A JUVENILE

Mrs. Hattie Martin Must Be Tried in Court of Grown Up People.

Mrs. Hattie Martin, the seventeen-year-old bride who was arrested a few days after her marriage to a Fort Crook soldier, for robbing the residence of Philip J. Kraus of \$15 in money and jewelry, will not be tried in juvenile court. Judge Kennedy has decided the fact she is married will prevent that court taking jurisdiction. The statutes of Nebraska provide that when a woman between sixteen and eighteen years of age marries she loses her minority, and the law gives the juvenile court jurisdiction over minors only. Hence her case will have to come up before the criminal branch of the district court.

County Attorney English has filed an information charging grand larceny, but this charge may be reduced to petit larceny as the property is supposed to have been taken at different times. Mrs. Martin is still in the county jail. A pathetic incident of the case is that her husband a few days after her arrest was transferred from Fort Crook to Fort Russell, and had to leave her during her trial.

Marriages Will Be Performed by Bismarck Without Cost.

OBJECT TO PROMOTE FIRESIDES

Der Schudge Will Kiss Each Bride, Maybe, and Present Lithographed Certificates of the Nuptials.

Weddings will be free during Ak-Sar-Ben week. This is the latest generous impulse of Samson's heart and it was announced Friday that Justice William Altstadt would be at the carnival grounds ready to tie the big knot for any couple which desired to be married in Omaha during the week of the red, yellow and green.

Besides the free ceremony, Justice Altstadt will issue free and present to each couple a handsome lithographed marriage certificate, hand illuminated by Miss McGinnis, clerk to the justice. A display of the certificates, which are

suitable for framing, may be seen at the office of the justice in the Faxon block. Some of them have passion flowers around the edges; others are spotted with bunches of forget-me-nots, while home grown pansies and some lilies of the valley, decorate other specimens of the beautiful card boards. Samples of Miss McGinnis' hand writing and illuminating are also shown, which make the work of the decorators in the shop of the Boygrafter, look like the whitewashing of a northern colored person.

Why Bismarck Did It. Justice Altstadt was moved to make the offer for several reasons. In the first place he believes in weddings and in using his influence to promote the organization of brides. Besides, young people have frequently made long trips to his home, long after the judge should be in his trundle bed, and arousing him from his slumbers, asked to have a wedding.
