CHOICE OF TAFT WISE ONE

John L. Webster Says Nebraska Republicans Named Right Man.

NONE AS WELL FITTED FOR PLACE

Democratic Platform He Condemns as Revival of States Rights, Supposed to Have Died with John C. Calhoun.

"The republican convention has brought the state of Nebraska into acute prominence in the domain of public discussion by its endorsement of Secretary Taft for the next president of the United States," says John L. Webster.
"Mr. Taft has had a remarkable career. Taking his age into consideration, it has only been equalled by Alexander Hamilton. No man has held so many official positions so early in life and been so eminently successful in all of them as Secretary Taft. He was solicitor general of the United States at an age when most men are classed as boys; he was comparatively a youth when a United States circuit judge, but there won for himself a reputation of high judicial character and learning. As governor of the Philippine islands he undertook a new and untried experiment. He accomplished great results for that far eastern people and opened the eyes of all America to the yet undeveloped possibilities of Pacific ocean commerce. He elevated the position of secretary of war from a mere clerical function, as it formerly was, to a position of statecraft. He assumed the burden of the government in the insular provinces. He is making American history in his efforts to establish safe, stable and popular governments in the islands under our domain, including independent Cuba. He is the prominent factor in the construction of the Isthmian canal, which, when completed, will be the greatest mechanical achievement in the history of the world, ancient or modern."

"None as well qualified."
"No man could be selected for president of the United States who had such varied

and large experiences in so many great questions that affect the prosperity of the country and the well-being of mankind.

"Therefore, the republicans of Nebraska acted wisely in endorsing him for the next president of the United States, and which fact will stand out before the nation, more prominently than anything else in any of the platforms adopted by any of the political parties of this state.

"The Democratic platform, in its tone and spirit, is a revival of the old state rights doctrine that we supposed reached their culmination in the days of John C. Calhoun and were buried as a thing of the past at the conclusion of the Civil war.

Republicans Bring Results.
"Whatever has been accomplished by way of increasing strength and growth and development of the United States, from that day to the present, has been accomplished by the republican party through its recognition that the general government was big enough and wise enough to look after the general interests of the people. It may be confessedly true that trusts and unlawful combinations of capital have taken advantage of their strength and opportunities to exact unjust contributions and to oppress localities and to discriminate between peoples and interests, but it is equally true that the present administration, through the instrumentalities of the republican party, has done more to curb, regulate and control such trusts, monopolies and combinations of capital than has been accomplished by all the states during the whole history of the life of the government.
"For the democratic party to undertake at this late day to insist that the states shall be placed in opposition to the general government in the regulation and control of these questions, will result in political conflicts and unwarranted contentions that will tend to embarrass and hamper the good work rather than to hamper any beneficial results. It is too late in the life and history of our country to make the state rights doctrine and state supremacy the chief slogan in a political campaign. Yet we understand and are advised that such is the wish of Mr. Bryan."

SEATTLE ASKS ABOUT OMAHA

Seeks and Receives Data on Real Estate in the Nebraska Metropolis.

At the request of the Seattle Real Estate association the Omaha Real Estate exchange has prepared information regarding Omaha realty for publication in a booklet which the Seattle association will issue on real estate conditions in the entire nation.
Some trouble was experienced in settling on the population. Some of the members wanted to make it 150,000, while others said, even though they believed it to be that much, it would be better to make the figure too low than run the risk of having them too high. The number decided on was 135,000. It was agreed that the best retail property in Omaha is worth \$5.00 a front foot, the best wholesale property \$25 and the best residence property \$20.
Here are the questions asked by Seattle and the answers made by Omaha:
1. Estimated population within city limits? 135,000.
2. What net interest does fully improved business property pay on the selling value? Five to 12 per cent, according to class of investment.
3. What was the highest price ever paid for property in your city after deducting value of improvements? \$2,000. Where located? Sixteenth and Douglas streets. When sold? 1896. For what used? Department store.
4. Over what area of the city is property worth within 25 per cent of the above figure? 1.25 per cent of the city.
5. What are the occupancies of the highest priced properties in your city? Railroads, drug stores, restaurants, jewelers, shoe stores. Name the order of highest rent paying? Railway office, \$50; drug store, \$40.
6. What is the market value of your best wholesale business property? \$25. Where located? N. 4th and Harney streets.
7. Over what area of the wholesale district is property worth within 25 per cent of the above price? Five blocks by eight blocks.
8. What is the market value of the best apartment house, family hotel and club house property? \$100 to \$200 per foot. Where located? Eighteenth to Twenty-sixth, Dodge to Harney.
9. What is the highest price which has been paid for strictly residence property? \$20 per foot. Where located? West Parknam district. Over what area does a unitation of within 25 per cent of this amount extend? Several blocks by seven blocks.
10. What is the value of property in best suburban residence district? \$15 to \$23 per foot. Where located? North and southwest. What transportation? Street cars. Time? Thirty minutes. Distance? Three miles. Fare? Five cents.
11. What is the market value for best property for working men's cottages? \$10 to \$15 per foot.
12. What is the value of acreage ripe for plating into city lots? \$1,000. Where located? Northwest.
13. At what per cent of market value is property assessed for taxation? Twenty per cent. Rate of city? 36 mills. County? 15.4 mills. State? 7 mills. School tax? 16
14. What is the water rate? 10 to 25 cents per 100 gallons. Gas rate? \$1.15 per thousand feet.
15. What is your highest grade water frontage worth? Have none. Where located? None.
16. What is the rental value per year of the best ground floor corner? Thirteen feet by thirty-eight, \$400.
17. What is the rental value per year per room of (A) Average high class hotel? \$700. (B) Average high class office above ground floor? Ninety cents to \$1.25 per square foot per month. (C) Average high class dwelling houses? Six hundred dollars to \$700 per year.

AGED PEDESTRIAN ARRIVES

Man on Way from Dunbar to Stuart Asks Omaha for Assistance.

After tramping seventy-one miles since noon Wednesday on a 290-mile journey to Stuart, Neb., Richard Moon of Dunbar arrived in Omaha Friday morning in the rainstorm and applied to the county commissioners for assistance to enable him to take a train the rest of the way. Moon is 50 years old, bent with age, his face covered with long gray whiskers. He carries a small telescope grip, a walking stick and an extra straw hat for sunny days. He has a son and a son-in-law in Holt county near Stuart, and he is trying to reach them. For eighteen years he has been living at Dunbar with his sister, but she recently sold out and it was necessary for him to move. Having no money he packed his belongings in the grip, picked up a stout stick and started on his 290-mile tramp. Since Wednesday he has been making over forty miles a day, but he says he is tired of walking and wants transportation to carry him the rest of the way.
"It was pretty hard walking," he said,

"and the roads seemed to be rough, at least they were hard to walk over. I got lost once and walked eight miles out of my way before I got back on the right road. If I can get to Stuart I will be all right, as my children will take care of me."

JUDGE READS THE PALMS

On Basis of This He Imposes Sentences to a Score of Vagrants.
Because Police Magistrate Bryce Crawford is proficient in the science of palmistry, a score of vagrants will shovel coffee on the streets of Omaha during the next ten days.
For more than a week people without a good reason for being in the city have been picked up by the police. Their personal wealth has ranged from a pocket knife to forty-five cents, and some of them have looked like mixed change for thirty-ropecks.
When a long line filed before Judge Crawford Friday he suddenly stopped asking questions and started to read palms. The sentence which the prisoners received depended on the lines which the police mag-
