UNION PACIFIC SHOWS DROP

Report Indicates Decrease in Receipts Over Expenses of Eighty Thousand Dollars.

For the first time in many moons the Union Pacific report of earnings as compiled by the comptroller fails to show a gain in receipts, but rather the report for the month of June shows a decrease in receipts over operating expenses and taxes of nearly \$50,000. The report is made up on different lines than any former report and the operations for 1907 have been compiled in accordance with the accounting rules of the Interstate Commerce commission effective July 1. The

results for the year 1906 have been restated in different form to conform to the new classification as near as practicable, The officers give as a reason for the great increase in operating expenses the increases in wages, the much greater cost of fuel for locometives and the greater charges for renewals and depreciation of equipment, which are required in the new accounting system. The gross receipts for July were \$7,233.

State Optometry Law.

BOARD EFFECTS ORGANIZATION

of patent medicines and fake insurance agents, since the organization at the Paxton hotel of the State Board of Optometry. for which a new Nebraska law provides. Governor Sheldon has named J. C. Hute son of Omaha as a member of this hoard. together with C. C. McLeese of Davenport and Max J. Egge of Grand Island. At the formal organization of the board Mr. Mc-

Leese was elected chairman and Mr. Hut-

son secretary and treasurer. It will be the duty of the board to hold examinations at stated periods and examine those who wish to practice optometry in the state of Nebraska, but the law provides those who have been in the optical business for two years or more, prior to March 27, 1907, will be given certificates of exemption by the board and will not be required to pass an examination.

The new board proposes to begin at once the issuance of two classes of certificates. The certificate issued to those who have been practicing opticians for two years will simply state that they are exempt from the requirements of the examination law, but will not assert that the person to whom the certificate is issued is proficient in optometry. The regular certificates will be issued only to those who pass the examination with a credit of 75 per cent.

Traveler Must Comply. The traveling optician, who does a legitimate business in a number of towns or cities, will be required to register in each county in which he practices.

Another provision of the law is that when spectacles are sold to customers in the future the optician must issue a bill of sale, which will bear the number of his certificate.

As Omaha opticians were instrumental in securing the passage of the law, they are enthusiastic over the possibility of stamp-ing out the peddlers who carry a small grip of junk spectacles from house to ouse, selling them as they do packages of Dr. Pillbaker's Compound of Goose Grease and Wild Tarberries for Rheumatism; and Lydia E. Hossentetter's Pink Prescription for Screaming Sufferers. It will also make it necessary for merchants who sell glasses to have at least one clerk who can get by the board of optometry.
