LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 11 - After a brief deliberation the jury in the case of the Santa Fe Railroad company, charged with rebating on shipments of cement from Arisona points, today rendered a verdict of guilty on all counts enumerated in the indictments found by the grand jury. The maximum fine for the offenses charged is \$1,100,000 and the minimum is \$35,000. An appeal will probably be taken.

PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD AT END Decision Reached to Continue Dependence Upon Beard of Home Missions.

ST. PAUL. Neb., Oct. 11 .- (Special.)-The most important action of the Presbyterian synod that closed yesterday was the decision to remain in connection with denominational board of home missions in New York. The report of the committee recommended independence of the board and an assessment upon the churches of 90 cents per month. A substitute for this recommendation, offered by Rev. N. H. Burdick, proposed continued dependence upon the hoard, but contemplated self support within three years by contributing to the board an amount equal to that drawn out, about \$18,000. The whole question was referred back to the committee, and their second report recommended continued dependence upon the board, and an apportionment to the churches for the use of the board equal this year to 45 cents per member. This was the final settlement of a question that has been before the synod

The committee unanimously nominated Rev. William H. Kearns, D. D., for state superintendent of missions and evangelist. Rev. W. H. Reynolds, D. D., presented reports for the committees on ministerial relief and men's societies. Rev. J. B. Currens presented the report on Sabbath school work. Mrs. Elizabeth M. Cauklin, the representative of the women's Synodiociety, reported for the work among young people.

Rev. James H. Balsbury reported for the committee on young people's societies. This committee presented a resolution. which was adopted by the synod, calling upon the State Christian Endeavor union to limit the term of the office of president of the union to two years.

> mystery sur-NEW YORK, Oct. unding the disappea of more than a week ago of Helena Maloney, daughter of Martin Maloney, the Philadelphia millionaire, was given a highly sensational turn today. At the time of Miss Maloney's disappearance, Samuel Clarkson, a young Englishman who had paid her marked attention, also dropped out of sight and it was reported and generally believed the couple had eloped and been married. Last night came the news from Montreal that the missing pair had been married by a Catholic priest in that city and then had returned to New York and salled for

Europe. Today comes the publication here of an unqualifield statement from Arthur Herbert Osborne, a young broker of this city. that Miss Maloney is his wife. According to Osborne's statement he and Miss. Maloney was married December 28, 1905, and the marriage never has been announced. Osborne declares that records in the notary's office at Mamaroneck show that Herbert Osborne married Helen Eugene on that date, and will prove his statement. He said that assumed names were used because at the time Miss Maloney desired to keep the marriage a secret. The fact that the marriage had taken place did become known, however, according to Osborne, and he declares that among those who learned of it was young Clarkson. He says that not only did Clarkson know of the marriage, but that only a short time ago he sought to have & annulled, having gone so far as to consult a New York lawyer on the subject.
