FOWLER MAKES HIS ESCAPE Secretary of Oriental Exclusion League Flees from Washington

Insane Asylum. SEATTLE Wash., Oct. 11.-Arthur E. Fowler, former secretary of the Japanese-Corean Exclusion league of Seattle, escaped Tuesday from the insane asylum at Stellacoom and made his way to Scattle, where it is pelieved he is being taken care of by friends. Fowler was arrested in Bellingham three weeks ago, examined by a unacy board and sent to the asylum. This followed his fruitless attempts to gain a ollowing for his pet scheme of oriental exlusion through a league of mammoth proportions. He started his work against the orientals in Scattle and enrolled the labor unions for a nominal membership fee. He expected to drive Japanese and Coreans out of this part of the country. Ultimately he hoped to drive them out of the United

Fowler had been a cook, and always declared that he had once been an artist. His rise from obscurity was literally made in a night. His new importance as a recognized leader of the exclusion movement in the northwest, together with overwork, is supposed to have deranged his mind. Fowler escaped by climbing a tree that grew close to the asylum wall, leaping to the
