NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—The recovery in stocks today after the spasmodic decline just at the opening brought a feeling of rolled to general anxiety in the financial district, which reached a stage of acute alarm in brokers' offices, where the course of events of Saturday, if continued, would run rapidly into disaster. The strain on the opening market was severe, Saturday's violent decline having had the usual after effects in the augmented volume of selling from holders either discouraged by the fail or forced to retire by withdrawal of credits and demands for additional margins from disturbed brokers.

The break at the closing affected the better sentiment which was growing up. Poreign money centers were as uneasy over the position in New York as were observers nearier home and sent selling orders into this market on a large scale. Renewed selling for Amsterdam account figured in this item. In some of the less active stocks the consequence to prices was serious. In the usual active speculative mediums there was some relative resistance to the depression from the outset. Almost immediately it became apparent that buying orders were in the market of a kind which have been conspicuously lacking for many days past important banking and financial interests were credited with buying stocks on a scale which was accepted, as a demonstration of condence and of determination to arrest the decline. The market thereupon righted triself convulsively and established a price level well over that of Saturday. The decisive relaxation in the call money market today relieved the uneasiness caused last week by its sustained firmness. New York exchange at Chicago tended upwards and the principal trisin of the interior demand for currency might be regarded, it was hoped, as relaxing.
