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ENGLISH FRIEND OF IRELAND

Arthur Chamberlain's Plan to Revive Island Industries.

NEW COMPANY IS ORGANIZED Sir Horace Plunkett Has a Plan to Assist Farmers—Opening Up New Markets—New Policy.

DUBLIN, Oct. 18.—(Special).—Arthur Chamberlain has on several occasions proved himself a good friend of Ireland, and has again given proof in a practical form of his interest in what may almost be called his adopted country.

Mr. Chamberlain has not been defeated by this hostility, however, but has announced the formation of a new company to be known as Irish Manufacturers, Limited, the object of which is to develop Irish industries of all kinds on a practical business basis.

Another scheme for the practical regeneration of Ireland is being worked out by Sir Horace Plunkett, who was until recently vice president of the Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Chamberlain Confident. I saw Mr. Chamberlain the other day as he was passing through Dublin and talked with him about his new scheme.

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What is chiefly novel in the new act is the provision for dealing with the surplus profits of the bolags.

Under the act of 1868 in Sweden 70 per cent of the surplus profits of the bolags went to the municipal authorities, 10 per cent to the local agricultural society and 20 per cent to the public treasury.

The law now recognizes the danger of leaving 70 per cent of this sum in the hands of the local authorities, which in future will get a very much smaller proportion.

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SWEDEN'S NEWEST LIQUOR LAW

Another Scheme of Dividing the Profits of the Gothenburg System.

LONDON, Oct. 19.—An important change has gone into effect in the law regulating the liquor trade in Sweden.

It is now recognized that critics of its most essential features were justified. The original aim was to apply all the profits after paying 5 per cent interest to the holders of the capital to beneficial purposes, municipal and national.

This must have worked out less nobly than it sounds, for it is in the allocation of the profits that the new law has had to make a change.
