WAS FIRST U. P. CONDUCTOR P. P. Shelby, Veteran Railroad Man, ta Visiting in Omaha

This Week.

P. P. Shelby of Boise, Idaho, is a guest at the Paxton hotel. This is Mr. Shelby's first visit to Omaha since 1887. He was conductor on the first Union Pacific train that run out of Omaha. He came to Omaha in 1865 after serving Mur years in the civil war, and went to work for this Union Pacific ratiroad as conductor. When I was running a train. the entire rolling stock of the Union Pacific consisted of seven box cars, seven nat cars and two and engines that road has today, they were mere toys," said Mr. Shelby "No. 28 was my caboose, which was simply a box car with windows to It. At first we carried only material for building the road. It was loaded on the cars from wagons drawn by buil teams. We carried no passengers. Finally the road was extended to Grand Island, and the train crew hated it because we were compelled to sleep in a straw stack at that place. The first freight the Union Pacific ever carried outside of its own building material was a mowing machine, shipped from Omaha to North Bend in September, 1886. Shortly after that I helped make out the first freight tariff sheet for the Union Pa-

"Then we began bandling freight, at the rate of one car load a day. "I remember well the first day we handled two car loads. It was a big event. It was loaded from wagons drawn by Bull teams, and as we were pulling out one of the bull got on the track and the whole train was ditched. That was the first wreck on the Union Pacific. I was on top thrown to the ground and lit straddle of the engineer's neck. He was laid up for three weeks and reported to the superfutendent that he had been struck by the smoke stack.
