GREAT STATE BANQUET PLANNED

This visit to the city is the cause of some apprehension, for a section of the English socialists have declared their intention of making hostife demonstrations along the line of the procession from Paddington station to the Guild hall, but the police have been forewarned. The general public may, however, be relied upon to give the grandson of Queen Victoria a hearty welcome.
