Mrs. Woodbury, as she placed the key in the door, thought she heard footsteps on the stairway from the hall.

BRITONS WANT TO SEE TAFT

His Admirers in British Isles Will Be Disappointed if He Does Not Stop.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—If Secretary Taft does not visit England on his way home from the east it will be a keen disappointment to his many admirers in the British Isles.

When the itinerary of his around-the-world trip was published in London and it was noticed that he planned to visit Berlin and St. Petersburg, but that he was not going to stop in either Paris or London, steps were taken to try and induce the secretary to come here for a day or two at least to meet some of the leading public men. In this case Mr. Taft would, of course, be received by King Edward, Washington was advised through the usual official channels that Mr. Taft's visit here would be agreeable, and fact is, the secretary has written that he is hurrying to get to London to report for the opening of congress that he will take a steamer from some English port instead of going direct from Berlin to Cherbourg. Those who have interested themselves in the matter have not yet expressed any opinion as to whether they would give favorable consideration to this proposal.

THREE MURDERS IN INDIANA

Men Riding on Lake Shore Freight Trains Killed and Robbed by Tramps.

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 11.—Three men, who were found dead along the Lake Shore & Michigan railway at various points in Indiana last week and supposed to have been murdered, were identified as E. A. Snyder of the railway detective force, said today.

The body of J. W. Murphy of Colorado Springs, who was caring for a load of horses, was found at South Bend November 2. The body of Ralph Kyle, a telegrapher at Edgerton, O., was found at Goshen, Ind., last Tuesday, and the body of Henry Rank was found at Laporte, Ind., on Friday. The detective established the identity of the dead men and declare they were murdered and robbed by tramps. The car in which Murphy was riding bore evidence of a struggle when examined at Buffalo, N. Y. The detectives have traced the tramps in the direction of Detroit and hope soon to make an arrest.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Mrs. Walter Wynn, former wife of a wealthy Chicago coal dealer, committed suicide here today by jumping from the roof of the Waldorf-Astoria hotel, and was found at the foot of the building at 11 o'clock.

International Spies Arrested.

TOULON, Nov. 11.—Five of the ring-leaders of what would appear to be a most important association of international spies were arrested here today by special detectives. The officials also secured a mass of

CHECK TO STOCK WATERING

New York Public Service Commission Issues Important Decision in Lighting Case.

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 11.—The New York Public Service commission in the Second district made public last night a decision which sets forth its attitude toward competition in public service utilities within a city, and toward what it regards as attempts to evade the prohibition by the new public service commission's law of inflation of "watering" of securities in the merging of public service corporations.

The decision is in the matter of the proposed purchase by a new corporation, the Lockport Light, Heat and Power company, and the Economy Light, Fuel and Power company, of the Lockport Light, Heat and Power company, and the Economy Light, Fuel and Power company, while admitting that the proposed purchase does technically constitute a merger within the meaning of the law, forbids the company to issue securities for a capitalization above \$700,000, equivalent to the total issues of the two old companies. The new company desired to issue stock and bonds to a total of \$1,300,000.

The decision says that the case in question is neither a consolidation nor a merger, but the purchase by a newly formed corporation of the property and franchises of the two existing companies and that in this respect it is within the law. It is decided, however, that the raising of rates over those at present existing, is illegal, and such action is prohibited.

DOUBLE CRIME IN DELAWARE

Fred M. Underhill, Charged with Jealousy, Killed His Wife and Her Sister.

WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 11.—Crazed with jealousy, Fred M. Underhill tonight shot and killed his wife and then turned the revolver upon her sister, Rachael Nelson, firing five bullets into her body. She also expected to die. After committing the murder Underhill walked to the home of Major Robertson and gave himself into custody.

Returning home and finding no meal awaiting him, Underhill secured his revolver and, going to the home of William Nelson, found there his wife and her sister. Without a word he fired two bullets into his wife's head and then turned the revolver upon her sister.
