mothers: We have to have all kinds of books to meet all kinds of demands, for we cannot give to a boy who has never read anything but Nick Carter, for instance, and who comes to the library for the first time to ind something interesting to read. "Ivan-hee" or even "Oliver Twist," as full of excitement as it is, he simply would not know what the words even meant, not to mention the wonderful word pictures. And so your boy or girl is constantly having these commonplace books facing him from our shelves, and as they are easy to get and very easy and pleasant to read, there is no question but that they will be chosen by almost anybody if left to his own sweet will.

But the boy's reading is not such a prob-But the boy's reading is not such a prob-lem, it seems to me, as that of your girls. For the boy's reading is of an active na-ture, and while they are lowering their mental standards 1. its overdoing, still it does not affect their everyday life as does this constant demand of girls for storles about girls. Girls in boarding schools, girls who take the place in the family which in real life is considered the privicge of the mother, girls "who decide such difficult problems when they should be leading a natural girlish life.
