IOWA STATE HAS BIG SENSATION Claim Made Aggies Have Friend or Foot Ball Squad.

Foot Ball Squad.

IOWA CITY, I.a., Nov. 14.—(Special.)—
There is one less member of the foot bell squad at the State University of Iowa. The man is still in school, but he is no longer permitted behind the closed gates of the Iowa athletic field. Back of the story of his dismissal there is a sensation the like of which Iowa university has not known in many a long day; or else a grave injustice has been done and to guard against this possible contingency, the man's name is withheld. The man himself came out for foot ball practice, playing with the freshman team. It developed later that he was a graduate of the State Agricultural college at Ames, where he won his honor initial on the foot ball team. This week, after this fact was discovered, his suit was taken away from him and he was forbidden entrance during secret practice. It is reported that the man made furious objections to this proceeding, all to no purpose. All of the coaches decline emphatically to say anything about the matter, but an alumnus of the university, who is very close to the athletic department, declares that the situation is the most unusual in the history of the school.

"Towa is the largest education institution in the state," he said, "and for that reason many students in the minor colleges take their final work here. We are mighty glad to have them enter the university, of course, and they have uniformly taken an active part in the various student enterprises. But it so happens that in this case which has arisen, there are certain suspicious circumstances alleged to have occurred. Now, mind you, I do not think that any of the officials of the State Agricultural college would willingly encourage any deal whereby they were placed in control of our plays or signals. As a matter of fact I do not believe that there is the slightest possibility of any such thing. But there is always a chance that this man, whose sympathies are manifestly with the Asgies, might, accidently, tell some of his oid leam mates, or class-

So he has been given every benefit of the doubt and politely requested to withdraw from the squad."

It is understood that the matter will be allowed to rest here until after the Ames game, but that if the Aggies give the slightest intimation in that contest of any knowledge of Iowa's play which might be based on inside information, the man who was recently dismissed will have an opportunity to explain.
