The amended interstate commerce aw, with its rate regulation provision has now been in force long enough to show where it fails most to accomplish fully the desired object. The Interstate Commerce commission consists of seven members whose authority extends over the entire United States and who alone are clothed with power to redress the grievances of all the shippers of the country arising in interstate traffic.

The utter impossibility of any one ommission made up of seven men to respond to all the demands made upon it in the regulation of railroads, serving 85,000,000 of people, is selfevident. It is admitted that a limit must be fixed somewhere and the fire underwriting experts, the fire wardens and the health board all agree that the limit has already been reached, if not exceeded. The fire insurance companies have served notice that they will hereafter refuse to carry insurance on buildings over the height prescribed by the building code commission. More than twenty skyscrapers in New York exceed the 250 feet limit, but they will not, of course, be affected by the new regula-
