INDIVIDUALS ARE TO BLAME

Dr. Woodrow Wilson Says All Corporate Wrongs Can He Traced to Some Person.

CLEVELAND, O. Nov. 17 .- Ambassador James Bryce of Great Britain, Governor Curtis Guild, Jr., of Massachusetts and President Woodrow Wilson of Princeton university, were guests of honor and the principal speakers at the fifty-eighth annual dinner of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce last night.

Ambassador Bryce discussed the problem of the improvement of man and how to increase his power over nature; in his address on "Some of the Tasks of Our Time," Governor Guild addressed himself to the evils of socialism and political corruption in his talk upon "The Essentials of Good Citizenship."

Speaking on "The Ideals of Public Life," President Wilson discussed the effects of unlawful business combinations and comdemned government supervision of industrial enterprises.

"We find many things done under forme Pet. of corporation organization," said Dr. Wilson, "which clearly are against the public .000 530 466 welfare as well as against all principles of private morality, and so we strike at corporations and, striking at corporations, embarrass the business of the country.
