SHIPPERS HAVE FIVE CASES BANNER CITY WORK MONTH

Omaha Patrons of Railroads Actively Before Commerce Commission.

PROTEST FOR BETTER TREATMENT

Over Two Million Dollars Per Year Involved and at Least Two Cases Among the Most Important.

Five Important cases of Omaha shippers, or shippers of this city interested with those in the same lines in Missouri river territory, are now pending before the Interstate Commerce commission, and at least one case had such small hope of securing an immediate bearing, that an injunction was secured against the carriers to prevent tariffs going into effect which would have increased transportation charges from 20 to 100 per cent.

Shippers estimate that more than \$2,000,000 per annum is involved in the cases, and at least two of them are among the most im partant cases ever filed with the commission. The five cases are: Wholesalers of Omaha, Kansas City and

St. Joseph, alleging discrimination against Missouri river points, as compared with rates to the Twin Cities. This case involves \$750,000 per year in transportation charges, according to John L. Webster, attorney for the shippers.
