OLD-TIME PLAZA IS NOW DOOMED

It Has to Go So that the Government May Build a Dam to Help Irrigate the Salt River Valley.

DUN'S REVIEW OF TRADE

General Improvement is Reported in Retail Distribution.

FACTORIES ON SHORTER TIME

Financial Conditions are Less Disturbing, Much Relief Resulting from Large Imports of Gold.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Dun's weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say:

Improvement is reported in retail trade and sentiment is more hopeful in some commercial departments. The resumption of active demand manufacturers restrict production. Financial conditions are less disturbing, much relief resulting from large imports of gold, while a better feeling is caused by announcement of further government aid, although the proposed bonds and certificates are not yet increased the activity, volume of money. Mercantile collections are irregular, some sections of the country report unsatisfactory conditions, while at other points they are slow. The final report for October indicates a favorable trade balance for the United States of \$2,764,484 and still better results are projected for November by preliminary reports available for three weeks.

Little alteration is noticed in quotations of iron and steel, reduction in prices being averted by restriction of output. BRADSTREET'S REVIEW OF TRADE

Actual Business Shows an Increased Degree of Quiet.

While a number of cities report that the tone of affairs has taken a turn for the better, actual business, taking the country as a whole, shows a further degree of quiet, both at wholesale and retail centers. It is evident that the wholesale trade circles do business in a more conservative manner and the numbers of cancellations resulting from cancellations of orders are a subject of widespread comment. Retail trade feels the effect of the smaller movement of certain lines, and although producers are reported more millar with checks tendered in payment, the industry is quiet and a drawback to sales.

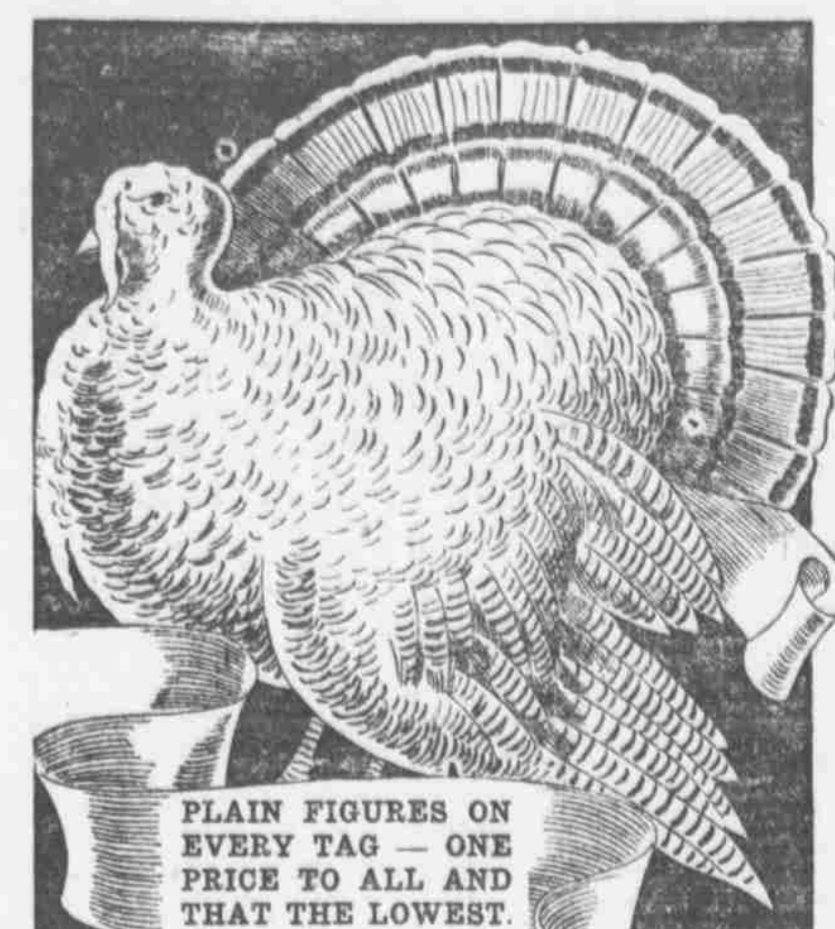
