

Under the protection of the notorious Ibraham Pasha, who is known as the 'despot of Kurdistan," Kurdish horsemen are making raids without discrimination, Turkish villagers suffering equally with Armenian homesteads on the plains around Diarbekir and Jezirch-Iber-Oman. Sixteen villages have been pillaged and burned within the last month in these districts and eight villages in the Sert district have met with the same fate. Several of these villages were composed entirely of Moslems, and in most cases the lives of the inhabitants were spared. though they were deprived of all their possessions.

The pinch of sunger already is being felt, as everywhere there is a scarcity of food, fodder and fuel. The missionaries are doing their best to mitigate the misery, but outside help is urgently needed, if the danger of a severe famine is to be averted,
