BRYAN GUEST OF NEW HAVEN

Speaks at Dedication of Fountain, Gift of Philo S. Bennett.

FOUR ADDRESSES DURING DAY

Many Prominent Democrats of New England Attend Banquet of Progressive League and Consult Nebraska Leader.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 29.—A marble fountain bearing the simple inscription "Philo Sherman Bennett gave this to the city," and erected on the green very close to the old pump, a town landmark, was dedicated today and handed over to the custody of the city. The gift was provided for by the will of Mr. Bennett, who was a New York merchant, but a life long resident here, and whose will was administered by William Jennings Bryan, a close friend. Mr. Bryan presented the fountain to the city during the exercises on the green. Mayor D. Studley receiving the gift in behalf of the city.

The fountain is of pure white Vermont marble, of Grecian design with an ornate canopy supported by six pillars, based on the general proportions of the Chierogio monument at Lycabettus, near the Acropolis. Prof. Weir of the Yale art school directed the work and the cost was about \$10,000.

Mr. Bryan came here from New York on a morning train and was the guest of Alexander Troup. He had arranged to make four addresses during his stay, the first one being that on the green. Immediately after this he was the guest of the city at a luncheon with Mayor Studley as the host. In the early afternoon a meeting of the New England Progressive Democratic league was addressed by Mr. Bryan. This evening Mr. Bryan held a reception at a banquet, leaving this to give an address at Yale Law School club at Hendrie hall, where Dean Henry Wade Rogers of the law school presided, and on concluding this he returned to the banquet to speak on "The Point of View." Many of the most prominent democrats in New England have come here to see Mr. Bryan and among other speakers before

POWERS PLEASED WITH CASE

Jury More Evenly Divided as to Politics Than Before.

DEFENSE MAKES ADMISSIONS

To Save Time It is Agreed that Fatal Bullet Was Fired from Window in the Office of Secretary of State.

GEORGETOWN, Ky., Nov. 29.—With the work of empanelling a jury completed and the opening statement of the prosecution already made, the state was ready today for the introduction of testimony in the trial of Caleb Powers, charged with the murder of William Goebel. Powers was in good spirits, evidently gratified that the jury is more evenly divided politically than at any former trial—four republicans, four democrats and four independent democrats being seated in the box.

Major Owens of counsel for the defense announced at the opening of the proceedings that the defense in order to save time would admit the fatal bullet was fired from the window of Powers' office when he was secretary of state, the spot where Goebel fell and the nature of the wound.

The first witness called by the state was E. M. Woodson, a civil engineer of Frankfort, who removed the bullet from the hackberry tree in the state house grounds. Woodson identified the block of wood taken from the tree containing the hole, and described the direction of the bullet, which he said came from the window of the secretary of state, Powers' office. Each juror was allowed to scrutinize this exhibit and Juror Linder asked several questions as to the position of the bullet when found in the tree.

Wool Growers' National Meeting.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 29.—(Special.)—The forty-fourth annual convention of the National Wool Growers' association will be held in Helena, Mont., on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, January 14, 15 and 16, 1908. This meeting is most important to the sheep and wool interests. It will be the last national gathering of sheepmen before the national parties make their nominations and it will be opportune for the sheepmen to meet at this time and let their views on the various public questions be made known through appropriate resolutions. To western men the meeting will be of especial interest on account of the range question, such education, administration of the forest reserves, the twenty-eight-hour law and

other important problems; to the sheepmen of the east, the west, the north and south, the important question of possible tariff revision is of vital interest. A proposition to hold wool auction sales in the United States the same as in London will be submitted to the wool growers. All these subjects will be discussed by able speakers, and the meeting will unquestionably be one of the greatest gatherings of stockmen ever held in this country.

All sheep and angora goat raisers and breeders, wool and mohair growers, feeders, wool buyers and commission men, are invited to come and participate in this meeting.

If the employees of the district government be included, all the persons employed in the executive branch of the government at Washington may be divided into two general classes about equal in number: Officials, clerks, professional, technical and scientific, and subaltern, mechanical and miscellaneous. A limited analysis of the

former class is shown in the following table. It is impossible without much more detailed statistics to analyze the second class owing to the great diversity of minor callings:
