This afternoon the convention spent the entire afternoon deciding whether or not to admit newspaper reporters to the meeting and later to a discussion of whether or not to accept the resignations of the officers. night that Crowe would be given the

The officers resigned because many of the local unions refused to stand by the agreement of the state officers that the men accept half cash and half clearing house certificates for their wages during the financial flurry. Following this refusal President White called the convention and today all the officers tendered their resignations. The convention will cost the miner's unions a total of something like \$10,000 and the one question to be decided is whether or not the officers shall be vindicated on their agreement with the operators to accept part clearing house certificates.

It was thought today by many of the leading miners that the resignations would not be accepted and that the officers would be vindicated. 
