A case has recently been carried to the supreme court to test the validity of the charter on this point. The supreme court upheld the charter and now personal injury suits are rare in The same provision does not apply in South Omana. The city is constantly beset by claimants, many of whom have slight foundation for their demands. The result is that the judgment fund shows a deficit of several thousand dollars at the present time.
