IT LOOKS LIKE MERRY WAR. President Murphy of National League Threatens Callahan. MEANS FIGHTING OTHER LEAGUES. Conley is Not So Aggressive as He Says He Entered Chicago in the Face of Opposition. CHICAGO, Dec. 19. - The bomb tossed into the camp of organized base ball by the announcement that James J. Callahan had been offered the St. Paul franchise for Chicago brought forth widespread objections, knocks and denials from President Murphy of the National League club, who said the invasion would bring on a base ball war that would never end until the Chicago club had been admitted to the President Conley of the American league club, when asked if he would try to keep an association team out, said: "No, unless they are already in. Besides, there is no legal way to keep them out. The American association has a perfect right to put a team into Chicago, and I feel like saying: 'Welcome to our city.'"

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BLUE LAWS GETTING AIRED. Running Elevator in Office Building for Doctors Necessary Labor. SO IS SELLING MILK AND CREAM. This Much Has Been Decided by Judge Crawford in Course of Testing the Sunday Observance Statutes. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" is a motto that was impressed on the minds of at least seven men who faced Judge Crawford in police court Thursday morning. Most of the morning was taken up with the trial of persons charged with violating the Sunday blue laws. Wherever it could be shown the labor performed was necessary the cases were dismissed. Those who performed unnecessary labor were fined \$1 and costs, which is the minimum fine. Those fined were J. L. Victor, who hauled trunks and baggage Sunday for the only way transfer company; Peter Christensen, who cleaned his harness in his barn at 2104 Center street Sunday; Mike Greiss and M. Schneider, who whittled away about an hour in the latter's back yard shooting a 21-caliber rifle at a target; E. C. Allen, who sold flowers at 1415 Farnam street; Alexander Calawick, who shined and polished shoes and brushed customers' clothes at 1520 Harney street; Sherman Heyn, who took pictures for hire in his gallery at 329 South Fifteenth street. Elevator Man Comes Free. S. Skarrier, who runs the passenger elevator in the War block, was tried for running the elevator on Sunday. He was defended by Frank T. Ransom, who contended that running an elevator in a large building was necessary labor. Evidence was introduced to show several physicians on the top floor of the War block have patients who come to them on Sunday for treatment and are not able to walk up several flights of stairs. Upon that showing City Prosecutor Daniel dismissed the case. John Foy, D. T. Freeman and C. Parlow, who drive wagons for the David Cole creamery, were tried for doing labor on Sunday. Judge Crawford held that delivering milk and cream on Sunday comes under
