City Prosecutor Says No More Sunday Arrests Till Tests,

MAYOR NOW PLANS SECRET RAID

Before Arresting Others Some Sabbath Violators Will Be Tried-Dahlman Takes Up Proscribed District Matter.

Two new moves in the regeneration of Omalia were decided on Tuesday; Mayor Dahlman has a secret plan of doing a little crusading in the proscribed district on his own account and City Prosecutor Daniel has called off the dogs of war and will have no more arrests for Sunday desecration until some of the million or more cases now stacked up are tested.

So come on, Santa Claus. "No more arrests will be made for violating the Sunday labor law until some of the cases are decided in the district court, and an interpretation put on the term common labor," said City Prosecutor Daniel Tuesday morning. "The only kind of labor the statute prohibits on Sunday is 'common labor.'

Whether the term was intended to include all sorts of labor, or was used in contra-distinction to skilled labor is a question on which the city prosecutor wants the epinion of the district court before he proceeds any further with the arrest and prosecution of Sunday laborers. One attorney whose client has been arrested for shaving a man on Sunday says that if his client is convicted he will let him go to jail and he will test the law by bringing habeas corpus proceedings.

Our Jim Has a Secret. Something is brewing in the matter of a crusade in the prescribed district, but what it is only Mayor Dahlman knows and he is as silent on the subject as the preverbial clam.

Monday morning he decided to request Wood Hartley, city abstracter, to furnish him with a report showing the ownership of record of every tract of land in that part of the city bounded roughly by Farnam street, Chicago street, Fourteenth street and the river. Asked why he desired such information the mayor absolutely refused to say a word on the subject. He did, however, intimate the request was in connection with the work now going on in the way of "cleaning up the district" as outlined in the police court by Judge Crawford Monday.

Many complaints have been received at the police station that women driven from the "cribs" on Ninth street are taking rooms in houses in other parts of the city. As fast as the complaints are received they are investigated and where the complaint is well founded the women are instructed to "move on." Just where they will be permitted to move they are not advised and police officers say they do not know themselves, since under orders of the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners they have been trying to drive these women from respectable neighborhoods. and they are now being driven from that part of town where heretofore it has been generally understood they would not be

The organization is to be permanent, as well as for the purpose of assisting in the International Tuberculosis congress to be held in Washington next September. The membership will not be limited to physicians, but those who desire to join and assist in the work of preventing and curing the disease which is taking thousands annually, will be admitted on payment of the nominal membership fee of \$1.
