Under the present electoral system in Prussia there are three classes of electors. Up to the present time the laboring man has been completely deprived of representation in the Prussian Parliament owing to the fact that he was overwhelmed at the final elections by the other two classes. The categories of electors are formed ar bitrarily by dividing the total amount of taxation received by the state into three equal parts. A small number of wealthy persons, paying the first third of the total taxation, select a certain number of men from their ranks to act as final votern: a more extended number of less wealthy persons, who pay the next third of the full amount of taxation, choose an ual number of final electors, while the third class of voters, composed of the remainder of the population, and including the workmen, whose numbers reach to the millions, are allowed to select a number of final voters equal to that chosen by

each of the other two classes. The total number of final electors selected by this process then proceed to cast the final vote, at which the representatives of the two first named classes always vote solidly together, thus shufting out any possibility of the election of a representative of the working classes.
