

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Values Work Lower on the Lack of Support from Bulls.

MORE LIFE TOWARD THE CLOSE

Some Good Exchanges Are Made—Wheat is Lower on Weak Cables, and Indications of Heavy World Shipments.

OMAHA, Jan. 11, 1908.

Grain market shows no jump and values work lower on lack of support from the bull side. Some good exchanges were made and more life was shown toward the close.

Wheat opened lower on weak cables and indications of heavy world shipments. Support was lacking at the start and a considerable break was experienced, which was recovered near the close by some interesting buying.

Corn opened steady and lacked snap. Selling depressed prices early and there was little or no feature to the lower market. Oats opened rather firm on good buying.

Near the close elevator people started to sell and caused slight break.

Primary wheat receipts were 621,000 bushels and shipments were 421,000 bushels, against receipts last year of 556,000 bushels and shipments of 382,000 bushels.

Corn receipts were 820,000 bushels, and shipments of 340,000 bushels, against receipts last year of 600,000 bushels and shipments of 388,000 bushels.

Clearances were 123,073 bushels of corn; 6,782 bushels of oats; and wheat and flour and shipments of 182,000 bushels.

Liverpool closed 1/2¢ lower on wheat and unchanged on corn.

Seaboard reported 400,000 bushels of wheat and 80,000 bushels of corn taken for export.

CHICAGO GRAIN AND PROVISIONS

Features of the Trading and Closing Prices on Board of Trade.

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—Expectation of increased world shipments was chiefly responsible for a bearish wheat market today.

Opening dull, the wheat market showed a tendency to sag in the absence of speculative interest. The selling movement that resulted in lower prices was due to an estimate for a foreign crop journal that the world's shipments for the month of December were reflected in the opening price.

At the start of the morning session of improvement, based on a report of probable shortage of Russian wheat, but the advance was soon lost.

Primary receipts were 327,000 bu., compared with 200,000 for the corresponding day a year ago. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 619,000 bu. Minneapolis, Duluth and Chicago reported receipts of 230 cars, as against 207 last week and 231 a year ago.

Corn opened steady on smaller country offerings, but broke sharply under the influence of liberal local receipts. Selling pressure was not great at the lower level, however, country advices of weather unfavorable to the crop in a check to the bear pressure.

Trade in oats was extremely dull and was confined almost to operations by pit traders. There was more or less selling pressure in sympathy with other grains and the tone was heavy.

Provisions were fairly active, the closed high at 5 1/2¢ and sold between 5 1/4¢ and 5 1/2¢.

Estimated receipts for Monday: Wheat, 50 cars; corn, 67 cars; oats, 221 cars; hogs, 58,000 head.

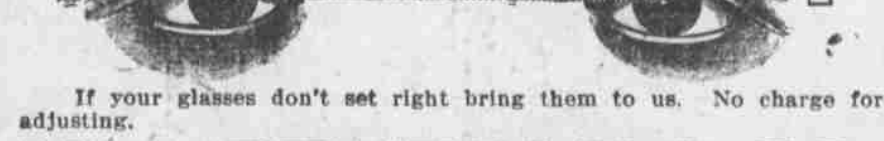
