The finaurance department of your office has for years licensed mutual fire insurance companies to transact business on a plan permitting them to fix a limit on the hability of members for assessments to pay losses on risks insured. Mutual policies, thus limiting liability, were approved by you and sanctioned by opinioms of former attorneys general. These rulings of this office do not appear in the published opinions of the department, and for that reason escaped my attention.
